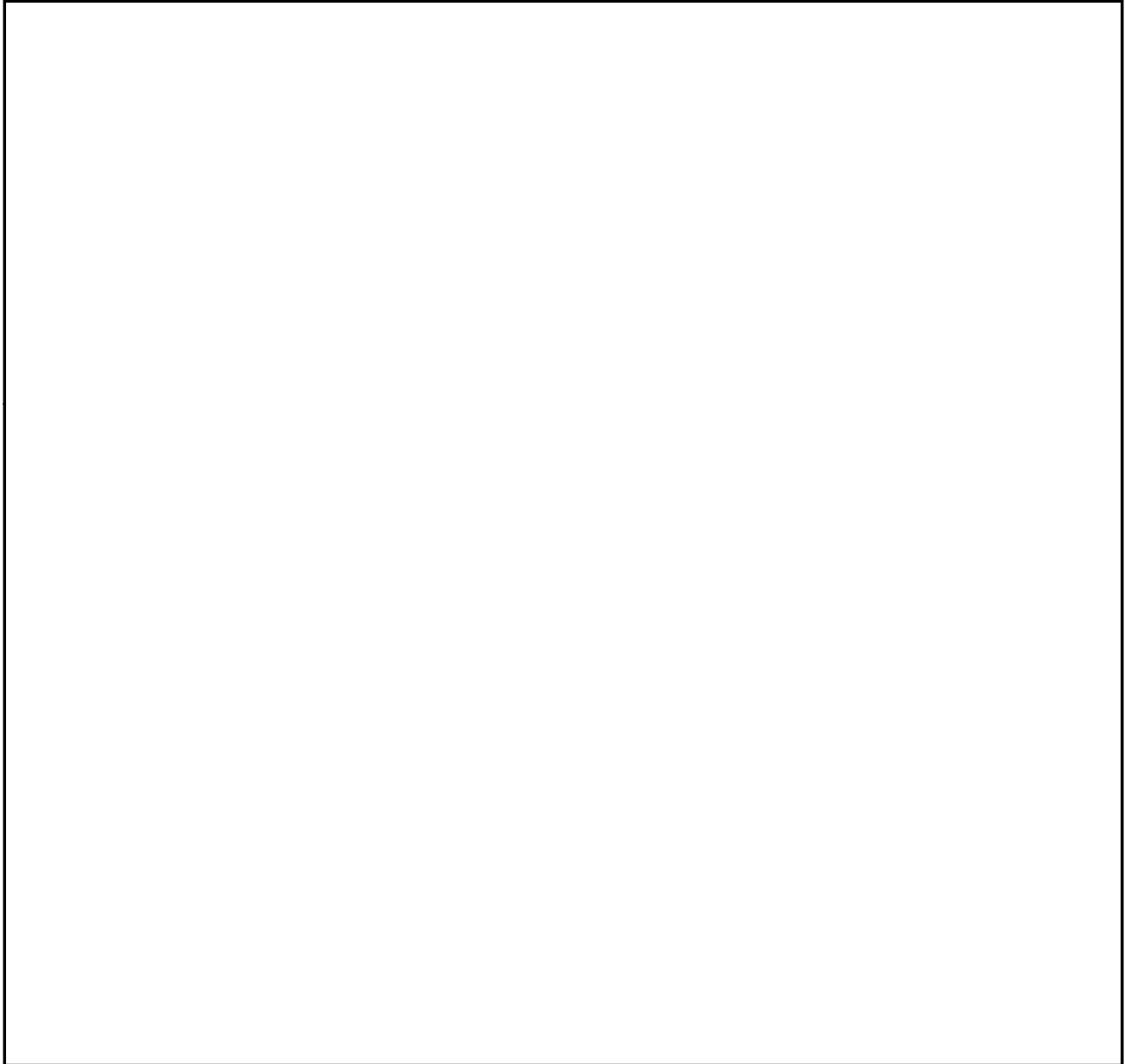

Terry Lynn Nichols, white male, date of birth April 1, 1955, place of birth Lapeer, Michigan, Social Security Account Number 371-68-4869, was interviewed. Nichols is currently incarcerated at the United States Penitentiary, Administration Maximum (ADX), 5880 State Highway 67 South, P.O. Box 8500, Florence, Colorado, 81226.

Investigator [redacted] and Lieutenant [redacted] United States Penitentiary, ADX, 5880 State Highway 67 South, P.O. Box 8500, Florence, Colorado, [redacted], were present during the interview.

Nichols is serving multiple life terms for his role in the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

In September 2004, Nichols wrote a letter to United States Attorney General John Ashcroft, United States Department of Justice, 950 Pennsylvania Avenue, NW, Washington, D.C. The letter advised that [redacted] and [redacted] lied during the trials against Nichols. The letter further advised that Nichols was willing to talk about his role in the 1995 bombing. Nichols received no response from the Attorney General.

[redacted] may have been involved in the 1995 bombing due to his knowledge of explosives and selling explosive material at gun shows. Nichols tried to raise the issue of [redacted] involvement with his attorney during the state trial but was told to focus on saving his own life. After the trial, Nichols' attorney did not want to raise the issue of [redacted] and Nichols felt abandoned.

In November 2004, an article appeared in a newspaper regarding plea negotiations between Nichols and the State of Oklahoma. Prior to Nichols' trial by the State of Oklahoma, five written questions were provided to Nichols for the purpose of establishing credibility with the District Attorney's Office, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The negotiations and the questions were secret but apparently leaked to the media in November 2004.

Nichols was approached by [redacted] asked Nichols about the questions, specifically in reference to the

location of bomb components. Nichols responded that he did not tell the truth regarding the location of the stored bomb components. Nichols [redacted] began discussing the 1995 bombing through verbal conversations and written letters. Nichols was seeking help [redacted] to ensure truth of the 1995 bombing in Oklahoma City was revealed.

A few days later, [redacted] approached Nichols and advised that [redacted] had an "independent forensic examiner" working on his case and would be willing to help Nichols. [redacted] wrote that the recovery of the material would be performed by a private investigator, [redacted] and listed several unknown Congressmen investigating the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing investigation.

Nichols provided a letter [redacted] which contained a detailed listing of bomb components but did not contain the location. In another letter, Nichols sent the location of the bomb components in a coded format. [redacted] received the list and asked for a second letter containing the same information. After several questions posed by [redacted] Nichols began to suspect [redacted] wanting to obtain the bomb components and use them for a criminal [redacted] Nichols limited his conversations with [redacted] which resulted in a threat to Nichols' family by [redacted]

Nichols has not had direct contact with [redacted] regarding the location of the bomb components. Nichols only spoke with [redacted] about the bomb components.

During the course of the discussions, Nichols learned the bomb components had been recovered from his prior residence in Kansas. A short time later, Nichols heard discussions of a planned bombing on the anniversary and the possible involvement of family members of Nichols. Due to the possibility of a bomb threat, Nichols requested to talk to law enforcement.

Nichols realizes that he was used by Timothy McVeigh and that based on all of the actions taken by McVeigh, the 1995 bombing appeared to have been conducted by Nichols.

#### History

In 1975, [redacted] Terry Nichols used to purchase blasting caps that were used on the family farm. The blasting caps

were used to remove stumps and debris from the fields. Nichols provided his driver's license to a retail store when purchasing blasting caps.

In April 1993, McVeigh met [redacted] Nichols at their farm in Michigan. McVeigh had returned from Waco, Texas, and observed the stand-off between law enforcement and David Koresch. A family member told all three men to come into the residence. The television displayed a fire at the Waco compound. McVeigh wanted to take action against law enforcement officers due to the fire. McVeigh wanted to return to Waco and shoot as many law enforcement officers and military personnel as possible. Nichols explained to McVeigh that any violent actions taken on his part would do no good. McVeigh decided not to take any actions against the law enforcement and military personnel.

In the summer 1993, McVeigh met with Nichols on their farm in Michigan. McVeigh showed Nichols six or eight Kinesticks with the nitromethane components. McVeigh added the nitromethane to the Kinesticks which resulted in Kinesticks becoming red or orange. McVeigh got the Kinesticks from [redacted] who was later identified as [redacted]

Later that summer, Nichols and McVeigh went to a gun show in Indiana or Ohio. McVeigh was very secretive about being seen in public with Nichols so they did not speak to each other during the gun show. McVeigh told Nichols to go to a display table operated by [redacted] who was selling blasting caps.

Nichols discussed buying blasting caps with [redacted] and was surprised that no identification was needed to purchase the blasting caps. [redacted] advised that as long as you said they were for farm use, no identifications is needed.

In the fall of 1994, Nichols was employed as a ranch hand at [redacted] farm in [redacted] Kansas. Nichols decided to quit his job and get into the gun show business selling guns and military surplus. Nichols decided that he and McVeigh would be business partners.

Nichols talked to McVeigh about McVeigh having an affair with his wife. Nichols' wife told Nichols that she thought McVeigh was a homosexual and had kissed him to see if he would react. McVeigh denied everything except the kiss from Nichols' wife.

During the Nichols' trial, his wife testified that she had an affair with McVeigh. McVeigh tried to explain that if something happened between McVeigh and Nichols' wife, it was "Carpe Diem," McVeigh's motto of seize the day. McVeigh further referenced The Turner Diaries, in which a woman walks in on a man in the shower and they make love. Nichols had to explain to McVeigh that there was a big difference between having an affair with his wife and a book.

Nichols had a yard sale to sell personal property prior to moving out of the [redacted] farm house. Because some of the furniture did not sell, Nichols asked McVeigh to rent a storage unit to hold the furniture. McVeigh rented the storage unit in the alias, Sean Rivers. Nichols did not know the storage unit was rented in an alias.

McVeigh began discussing the oppression of the United States Federal Government and what action could be taken in the event marshal law was imposed. The subject had been discussed for several years, going back to 1988. Nichols and McVeigh prided themselves on being prepared for any disaster or oppression from the United States Federal Government.

McVeigh approached Nichols and asked Nichols for help acquiring ammonium nitrate. McVeigh wanted the ammonium nitrate in case there was a natural disaster or in the event of a nuclear war. McVeigh was told to go to any grain elevator and purchase the material. McVeigh traveled to several elevators, buying a few bags at each location. McVeigh was uncomfortable buying the bags because he did not have a good reason to be purchasing the material. McVeigh asked Nichols how he could acquire one ton of ammonium nitrate. McVeigh was told to call around to the local elevators and inquire who had that much material on hand and make the purchase. McVeigh located such an elevator in McPherson, Kansas. McVeigh needed help transporting one ton of ammonium nitrate and Nichols agreed to help pick up the material.

On September 30, 1994, Nichols and McVeigh drove to McPherson, Kansas, in Nichols' truck. Upon arrival in McPherson, McVeigh jumped out of the truck and went to make telephone calls. Nichols went to the elevator and purchased one ton of ammonium nitrate, receiving (40) 50 pound bags. Nichols told the salesman that the ammonium nitrate was for a wheat field and discussed the different types of fertilizer. After completing the purchase, Nichols drove through town and picked up McVeigh. Due to the

potential for rain, Nichols and McVeigh stopped at a camper store outside of McPherson and purchased a camper shell for Nichols' truck. McVeigh was very nervous while the salesman viewed the fertilizer in the back of the truck. Nichols and McVeigh returned to Herington, Kansas. Nichols gave the receipt for the purchase to McVeigh. The ammonium nitrate was placed in a storage unit near a Pizza Hut until April 18, 1995.

After arriving in Herington, Nichols secured the camper shell to the truck using bolts. [REDACTED] observed Nichols working on his truck, securing the camper shell.

At no time was any equipment owned by [REDACTED] used to pick up fertilizer. Nichols did not place any trailers on his truck to move the ammonium nitrate.

During this same time, McVeigh began to discuss acquiring blasting caps, explosives and guns. The blasting caps and explosives would have to be acquired without being traced to McVeigh due to marshal law. The guns would have to be purchased second hand without being traced by law enforcement. If the guns were registered to McVeigh, they would know where to look during marshal law.

Nichols agreed to accompany McVeigh on a reconnaissance of a quarry located in Marion, Kansas. The first reconnaissance resulted in locating two locked, steel buildings.

During the second visit, McVeigh and Nichols drove McVeigh's Spectrum and parked approximately one-half mile from the quarry. They walked across the field and broke into the steel building. One building contained blasting caps and the other contained Tovex. Nichols and McVeigh stole the following material from the steel buildings:

Electric blasting caps with delays;

Primadet non-electric blasting caps with orange shock tubes; and

Tovex, described as a "sausage" shaped explosive which came in two sizes.

McVeigh and Nichols each carried a case of blasting caps and a case of Tovex. They walked the ½ mile to the car and

completed two or three trips, filling McVeigh's trunk and back seat. They completed the robbery by approximately 1:00 a.m.

McVeigh and Nichols took the stolen material to Nichols' residence located on the [redacted] farm and stored it in the garage.

The next day, McVeigh told Nichols they were moving the stolen material to Arizona. Nichols observed McVeigh add methamphetamine to a bottle of Gatorade. When confronted by Nichols, McVeigh advised that it would help him stay awake. McVeigh and Nichols loaded the stolen material in Nichols' truck and drove it to a campsite near Kingman, Arizona.

Nichols stayed with the material at the camp site and McVeigh went into Kingman to meet with [redacted] McVeigh brought [redacted] to the camp site driving a Ford Bronco. McVeigh had several conversations with [redacted] without Nichols being allowed to participate. McVeigh took great effort to keep [redacted] and Nichols from talking with each other. The next day, McVeigh found a storage shed for the stolen material. Prior to leaving Arizona, Nichols moved the stolen material to a rented storage unit in Flagstaff, Arizona. The rental unit was rented under an alias which Nichols could not recall. [redacted] repackaged the blasting caps in Christmas wrapping paper. A short time later, the stolen material was again moved and added to the rented storage unit in Herington, Kansas.

McVeigh told Nichols that [redacted] took illegal drugs including methamphetamine, marijuana and possibly cocaine.

After returning to Kansas, McVeigh attended a gun show in Kingman, Arizona, and Nichols went to Las Vegas, Nevada, to visit [redacted] Nichols and McVeigh attended a gun show in Colorado Springs, Colorado from October 14-16, 1994.

While driving back to Kansas after the gun show in Colorado Springs, McVeigh told Nichols he needed a second ton of ammonium nitrate. McVeigh wanted to "make a statement against the United States Federal Government, that they had gone too far and needed to be stopped." McVeigh was angry at the response from the United States Federal Government to a shooting in Ruby Ridge, Idaho and the siege in Waco. "The government will have to learn and I will blow something up. No one will stop me, absolutely no one, I don't care who it is." Nichols believed that McVeigh was going to blow up a monument or something similar. Nichols told McVeigh that

he did not want to get more ammonium nitrate. McVeigh displayed a .45 caliber pistol and told Nichols that they would have to buy or steal the ammonium nitrate. McVeigh told Nichols "people can be forced to do things." McVeigh kept referring to "we have to make a statement." Nichols believed that McVeigh had others helping with his plan. Any objections made by Nichols were met with a response from McVeigh that Nichols was "in too deep" and that it would look like Nichols planned everything.

Nichols and McVeigh stopped for the night in Salinas, Kansas, and rented a room under the alias [REDACTED]. The alias was made up from names of friends Nichols had in Michigan.

The next day, Nichols and McVeigh drove to McPherson, Kansas. While driving into town, McVeigh again left the vehicle to make telephone calls and Nichols completed the purchase of one ton of ammonium nitrate. Nichols picked up McVeigh while driving out of town and returned to Herington, Kansas. The second ton of fertilizer was added to the storage unit. Nichols' furniture was removed from the storage unit and placed in a storage unit in Counsel Grove, Kansas.

On October 24, 1994, Nichols [REDACTED] rented a post office box because [REDACTED] was angry she could not contact Nichols. [REDACTED] was having problems and Nichols often traveled to Las Vegas to help [REDACTED].

In October 1994, three 55 gallon drums of nitromethane fuel were purchased from the Ennis Race Track, Ennis, Texas. Six white plastic barrels were purchased from a dairy plant in Kansas. The plastic barrels were used to hold cleansing fluid that cleaned the lines in the dairy plant.

McVeigh received news that his grandfather had died and wanted to meet with Nichols. Nichols left Las Vegas and traveled to Kingman, Arizona. McVeigh had already left for New York, so Nichols returned to Kansas and camped at the Geary Lake Wildlife area.

McVeigh had told Nichols that [REDACTED] was going to help them begin a business selling material at gun shows. McVeigh then began discussing a plan to rob [REDACTED] which evolved into Nichols robbing [REDACTED]. McVeigh could not be involved in the robbery because [REDACTED] knew McVeigh.

On approximately November 1, 1994, McVeigh came to the Nichols' campsite at the Geary Lake Wildlife area, near Junction City, Kansas. McVeigh provided a map of [redacted] residence, including where to park while committing the robbery. McVeigh advised that [redacted] would be leaving the residence at approximately 5:00 p.m. and [redacted] would be home alone. McVeigh wanted \$2,000.00 from the robbery and the rest could be kept by Nichols. [redacted] gun show table was nicknamed [redacted] McVeigh told Nichols that the "goodies" were in the back room. The "goodies" were speciality ammunition, cannon fuse and Kinestick components. McVeigh further advised that [redacted] did not keep a serial number listing of his weapons and that the house would contain guns and money. Nichols was told not to touch anything in [redacted] room.

McVeigh gave Nichols a Mossberg 12 gauge shotgun with a pistol grip and a 9 MM Smith & Wesson pistol to complete the robbery. Nichols also carried his Glock Model 19 during the robbery. Nichols was told by McVeigh that he was in too deep to turn back now. McVeigh told Nichols that this was the last thing he would have to do and they could go their separate ways.

On approximately November 5, 1994, Nichols began driving to [redacted] home in [redacted] Arkansas. Nichols realized that he did not have a way to secure [redacted] so he stopped at a store and purchased plastic flex cuffs to secure [redacted]

After arriving late [redacted] Arkansas, Nichols camped near [redacted] residence.

The next day, Nichols conducted surveillance of [redacted] residence and found a better place to park his truck than McVeigh had instructed. Nichols verified that he had the correct residence while approaching it from the rear. In the early afternoon, Nichols approached [redacted] residence from the rear, crossing a creek. After completing the route, Nichols left the area.

At approximately 3:30 p.m., Nichols began surveillance on [redacted] residence and watched [redacted] leave at approximately 5:00 p.m. It began to rain and as Nichols returned to his truck, the creek became very full and he could not forge the creek. Nichols remained in his truck all night.

At approximately 9:00 am the next day, Nichols approached [redacted] residence wearing camouflage pants, shirt and hat, along

with panty hose over his face. Due to the tight fit, Nichols wore his glasses on the outside of the panty hose. Nichols had used a bungee cord to make a sling for the shotgun.

Nichols waited for [redacted] to exit his residence, confronted [redacted] and both men went back into the residence. Nichols secured [redacted] using the plastic flex cuffs and placed [redacted] inside the residence. Nichols began loading guns into [redacted] van and [redacted] protested loudly not to take his van. Nichols became very afraid because he heard a siren from a police car drive past the driveway to [redacted] residence.

Nichols opened a filing cabinet in the house and removed an envelope containing \$37,000.00.

[redacted] Nichols stole approximately 70 guns, gold coins and cash from [redacted] residence. Nichols removed a pillow case and a quilt from [redacted] bed so he could cover up the stolen material. While removing material from the house, Nichols viewed two cardboard boxes and a cardboard mail tube near a door. It appeared the boxes had recently been delivered from a mail delivery service. One box contained various ammunition and the other contained tubes of nitromethane. The cardboard tube contained an empty Light Anti-tank Weapons (LAW) Rocket tube. Nichols placed all the material in the van. The nitromethane tubes were recovered by the FBI in April 2005 and the LAW Rocket tube was recovered in April 1995 by the FBI.

Nichols drove the van to his truck and loaded the stolen material into his truck. Nichols changed his camouflage clothing to a shirt and blue jeans. Prior to leaving the area, Nichols could not find his wallet. Nichols began searching and found his wallet near the van.

Nichols drove to his campsite in Junction City. Nichols wanted to get a shower and a hotel room so he rented a room at the Sunset Hotel and the next night moved to the Traveler's Inn. Nichols called from a payphone and talked to McVeigh's father and sister and left the payphone telephone number for McVeigh to call. McVeigh tried to call from a payphone to a payphone number given by Nichols. The calls could not be completed. In frustration, Nichols called from his hotel room and talked to McVeigh at his father's residence. McVeigh was very angry Nichols would call him at his father's residence. Nichols believed that he talked to McVeigh on November 6 or 7, 1994. Nichols told McVeigh about the

robbery. Nichols sent a Federal Express package to McVeigh in New York containing \$2,000.00.

Several statements were made at trial that were incorrect. Nichols did not wear Israeli Army assault boots or possess a Garret wire. Nichols did not loosen any lug nuts on any vehicles.

Telephone records presented at trial indicated that McVeigh contacted [redacted] and told him [redacted], meaning Nichols robbed [redacted]. The records indicate the call was placed prior to Nichols telling McVeigh the robbery had occurred.

[redacted] only reported a cash loss of \$8,700.00 to law enforcement.

The stolen material was placed in a rented storage shed in Counsel Grove, Kansas. Due to the location of the rented storage shed, Nichols went to the Marion Recycling Center and obtained four 55 gallon plastic barrels. Two of the barrels were white and two were white with blue rings. Nichols placed the stolen material inside the barrels. The FBI recovered all four barrels in Nichols' garage. They were not used to hold the bomb that was transported by the Ryder truck.

On approximately November 6, 1994, [redacted] needed help [redacted]. Nichols cancelled his flight from Kansas City Airport and traveled to [redacted]. Nichols took the money from the [redacted] robbery and hid \$20,000.00 [redacted] kitchen. Nichols left a sealed letter [redacted] with instructions not to open the letter until he returned. Nichols spent 10 days [redacted] [redacted] and traveled to the Philippines. One of the reasons for leaving was that Nichols believed that McVeigh was going to blow up something during the holiday season.

In November 1994, Nichols split from McVeigh due to several reasons. McVeigh was getting more radical regarding the United States Federal Government and was using illegal drugs.

In February 1995, Nichols returned to the United States through the Las Vegas Airport. Nichols went to [redacted] apartment and could not find the hidden money. Nichols believed [redacted] [redacted] had stolen the money for illegal drug purchases. Nichols called [redacted] who told Nichols that the money was stored in her real estate office. [redacted] gave Nichols an envelope containing

\$15,000.00. [redacted] kept \$5,000.00 of the money [redacted] [redacted] which they both agreed not to pay each other. [redacted] returned \$2,000.00 back to Nichols. Nichols was going to need a lot of cash to buy inventory to sell at the gun shows. Nichols also wanted to buy his family a house in Kansas to raise cash crops such as blue berries, pumpkins and sweet corn.

Nichols called McVeigh upon his return to the United States. McVeigh asked for \$3,000.00 to purchase a vehicle. McVeigh was living with [redacted] who used to work for [redacted]. Nichols sent a Federal Express Package to McVeigh in Michigan containing \$3,000.00.

Nichols returned to Kansas and rented a room at the Sunset Motel. Nichols and McVeigh met and Nichols bought a note held by McVeigh for the sale of an automobile [redacted]. McVeigh told Nichols that he and [redacted] had taken one-third of the stolen guns and sold them at gun shows. Nichols was angry because McVeigh told him except for \$2,000.00, the rest of the material was Nichols. A short time later, Nichols began selling the stolen guns at local gun shows. The FBI recovered the remaining stolen guns when they searched Nichols' residence in Kansas in 1995.

On Friday, April 14, 1995, at approximately 10:00 a.m., McVeigh called Nichols and asked if they could have a meeting. Nichols told McVeigh that he was traveling to Junction City and Manhattan, Kansas. McVeigh told Nichols that he was already in Junction City and they should meet at Geary Lake Wildlife Area. Nichols arrived at Geary Lake Wildlife Area, but could not locate McVeigh's automobile. McVeigh had changed vehicles and was now driving an older automobile. McVeigh advised that his previous automobile had died and this was a loaner vehicle.

McVeigh told Nichols that he had rented or reserved a Ryder rental truck for the following weeks. The rental truck was needed to move the fertilizer and blasting material.

McVeigh pulled out a milk crate which contained several military surplus items, including video tapes and gun cleaning kits. Along with a Ruger .223 Mini 14 rifle, McVeigh offered to sell the contents of the milk crate for \$300.00. McVeigh was low on cash and had to go to New York. Nichols agreed to buy the contents of the milk crate and offered to sell the gun back to McVeigh whenever he had the cash. McVeigh advised he may have to travel to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma to drop off an automobile and

asked if Nichols would be willing to give him a ride. Nichols did not want to be associated with McVeigh due to his radical beliefs and illegal drug use. Nichols declined to provide a ride to McVeigh.

The milk crate contained an oil filter that McVeigh purchased to be place on McVeigh's old automobile. McVeigh provided the oil filter and the receipt to Nichols to return it for a refund.

Nichols did not want to make McVeigh angry because Nichols had witnessed McVeigh talk about actions he would take against someone who made him angry.

On Saturday, April 15, 1995, Nichols and his family drove to Manhattan, Kansas, and returned the oil filter.

On Sunday, April 16, 1995, Nichols received a call at his residence at approximately 2:00 or 3:00 p.m. from McVeigh. McVeigh asked for a ride from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Nichols declined to pick up McVeigh and McVeigh became angry and started yelling at the Nichols. Nichols finally agreed and McVeigh told Nichols to tell his wife that he was going to pick up McVeigh in Omaha, Nebraska. McVeigh gave directions to Nichols as to where McVeigh would be located in Oklahoma. [redacted] asked to go but Nichols refused based on the fact that McVeigh did not like [redacted]

Nichols agreed to drive the five hours and pick up McVeigh in Oklahoma City. Nichols left his residence and began to drive towards the interstate. As he was driving past Tim's Amoco, an automobile resembling McVeigh's left the gasoline station traveling at a high rate of speed. Nichols sped up and began flashing his lights, following the vehicle onto the interstate. The vehicle and Nichols pulled over at a historical marker and McVeigh exited the vehicle. McVeigh explained that he wanted to make sure Nichols would come pick him up in Oklahoma City.

McVeigh always drove in excess of the speed limit, usually 90 miles an hour. After departing from the historical marker, Nichols knew McVeigh would arrive in Oklahoma City much earlier than Nichols. Nichols asked McVeigh to return a television set that McVeigh had picked up when he was in Las Vegas. McVeigh told Nichols that the television set was in Oklahoma City.

Another example of McVeigh making it appear that Nichols did everything was that McVeigh used a pre-paid calling card purchased by Nichols to call Nichols from Tim's Amoco. McVeigh always carried coins in his vehicle and used pay telephones.

Nichols arrived in Oklahoma City but could not locate McVeigh. Nichols drove around several city blocks hoping to locate McVeigh. It was raining very hard.

Nichols was not looking for a target building but simply could not find McVeigh. This contrasted the theory stated by the United States Government during trial.

At approximately 8:00 p.m., Nichols located McVeigh who got in to the vehicle driven by Nichols. As they were driving out of downtown, McVeigh pointed out a building that Nichols believed was the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building. Nichols asked about the television and McVeigh said that it was in Kansas. Nichols believed that he told the FBI during his interview that they picked up the television in Oklahoma City, which was incorrect. McVeigh removed the license plate from his vehicle and placed it in the truck so it would not be stolen while parked in Oklahoma City.

While driving back to Kansas, McVeigh discussed his motivation for his anger with the United States Federal Government. McVeigh believed the "government must stop what they are doing, make a statement strong enough to get their attention." McVeigh could not wait any longer. McVeigh told Nichols that he was planning something big and Nichols asked if he was going to rob a bank. McVeigh replied that it was something big.

McVeigh told Nichols that he would need his help loading the fertilizer and blasting material and expected Nichols to be at the storage shed. McVeigh told Nichols to bring his drill to help load the material.

On Monday April 17, 1995, Nichols drove  the Kansas City Airport. While at the airport, Nichols called McVeigh.

On Tuesday April 18, 1995, Nichols woke at 6:00 a.m. and did not want to help McVeigh load the material. Nichols fell asleep at the kitchen table, woke a short time later and realized that McVeigh would come to the house if he did not go to the storage unit. Nichols left his residence and drove to the Pizza

Hut parking lot. McVeigh was angry that Nichols was late and the two men began loading the material into the rental truck. The following is a list of material they loaded into the rental truck:

(3) 55 gallon drums of nitromethane fuel;

(80) 50 pound bags of ammonium nitrate fertilizer;

Approximately 10 bags of ammonium nitrate fertilizer purchased by McVeigh;

(6) white plastic barrels;

(5) steel barrels with snap-rings holding on the lids;

Green cannon fuse; and

Blasting caps, Tovex, Kinestick.

After loading the material, McVeigh told Nichols to follow him to Junction City and to Geary Lake Wildlife Area.

Initially, McVeigh parked the rental truck on a hill and Nichols told him to move the truck to a less visible location.

Sergeant  testified at trial that he saw Nichols' truck and the rental truck, which was correct.

McVeigh began pouring the bags of ammonium nitrate into the plastic barrels. The ammonium nitrate had gotten wet and begun to clump together. Nichols believed that the moist ammonium nitrate would not explode but he did not tell McVeigh. McVeigh had to make a funnel to pour the ammonium nitrate into the plastic barrels because the lids could not be removed. McVeigh filled the plastic barrels through the three inch hole in the top of the plastic barrels.

After filling the plastic and steel barrels, McVeigh weighed out nitromethane fuel and added it to the barrels. The fuel was weighed out using a bathroom scale and added to the barrels. The fuel was added to the barrels and not mixed. Nichols believed McVeigh weighed the 165 gallons of fuel in a five gallon plastic pail. The fuel was equally distributed between the barrels.

Nichols did not use a fuel counter that he purchased at the Defense Reutilization and Marketing Office (DRMO), Fort Riley, Kansas.

McVeigh ran out of nitromethane fuel due to a miscalculation. McVeigh told Nichols to siphon ten to fifteen gallons of diesel fuel from his truck and add it to the barrels. McVeigh wired each barrel with a stick of Tovex, a Kinestick and a Primadet blasting cap.

The drill was used to place a hole between the cab of the truck and the storage compartment. A plastic hose was placed in the hole and painted yellow to match the truck. Green Cannon fuse was strung from the cab of the truck, through the hole and into the storage compartment.

The barrels were placed in the truck in the form of a pyramid. The base of the pyramid was facing the nearest exterior wall of the truck and would be closest to the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building. The barrels were secured using four 4" X 4" timbers secured to the floor to prevent shifting.

McVeigh had learned about how to position the barrels and shape charges from the book, Homemade C-4.

Ten bags of ammonium nitrate fertilizer remained and were stacked at the tip of the pyramid. Diesel fuel from Nichols' truck was placed in the bags, along with a Kinestick and possibly a stick of Tovex.

The wiring of the barrels began with the green cannon fuse being attached to the non-electric blasting cap. The non-electric blasting cap was attached to a Primadet blasting cap. The Primadet blasting cap discharged a Kinestick. The Kinestick, attached to a stick of Tovex, discharged the ammonium nitrate.

The entire process to build the bomb took approximately five hours. At around noon, McVeigh drove the rental truck in the direction of Junction City and Nichols drove to Fort Riley for a DRMO viewing of items up for auction.

Nichols told the FBI that he was at Fort Riley all day, which was incorrect.

On Wednesday April 19, 1995, Nichols put the empty fertilizer bags in his garage.

On Thursday April 20, 1995, Nichols' went shopping for an antenna for his television because it did not pick up many channels and his wife wanted to watch television. Nichols could not find an antenna and went to the local cable company to sign up for cable television. While at the office, Nichols saw news reports of the bombing in Oklahoma City. Nichols went to the local market and bought newspapers containing stories of the bombing. The FBI recovered the newspapers. During the evening, Nichols went to the storage unit. Nichols took out a duffle bag, rifle, license plate from McVeigh's vehicle, and ruck sack left by McVeigh. Along with McVeigh's property, Nichols moved the case of blasting caps and nitromethane to his truck. Nichols returned and swept out the storage unit.

Nichols began removing property from his residence that linked him to McVeigh. Nichols placed the following material into his truck:

Several empty fertilizer bags;

A .50 caliber rifle stolen from

The license plate from McVeigh's vehicle; and

An ammunition can containing an anti-personnel hand grenade.

Nichols drove approximately three miles south of town. Nichols bundled the fertilizer bags together and placed in the river using a rock to hold them underwater. He placed a second bundle of fertilizer bags in a pile of material that was going to be burned near a construction site.

Nichols drove approximately two miles north of town and placed the .50 caliber rifle under a mattress or box spring on the bank of a river. He placed the hand grenade either near the rifle or thrown in the river. He threw McVeigh's license plate in a river just north of town.

On Friday April 21, 1995, Nichols took the blasting caps and nitromethane tubes and wrapped them in cellophane. Nichols placed the material under his residence. The cellophane was

provided by McVeigh in the milk crate that Nichols purchased from McVeigh one week earlier.

Nichols went to the local lumber company to trade boxes of nails for roof shingles. Prior to entering the lumber company, the radio news broadcast that law enforcement was looking for [redacted] and Terry Nichols. Nichols went home and saw a press conference with Attorney General Janet Reno. Attorney General Reno advised that those responsible for the bombing would be located and get the death penalty. Nichols became very afraid and did not want another "Waco" at his residence that would harm his family. Nichols removed a gun and personal property from his truck and placed it in the house. Nichols removed a mercury switch from the milk crate purchased from McVeigh and put it in the truck. Nichols told his wife that he did not pick up McVeigh in Omaha, but actually picked him up in Oklahoma City.

Nichols wanted to throw the mercury switch in the river but believed that he was under surveillance. Nichols drove to a local surplus store and crushed the mercury switch in the parking lot.

Nichols returned to his residence and located small bottles of fertilizer that he was going to sell at the gun shows. Nichols placed the fertilizer on the front lawn because the landscaping had been neglected by the previous tenants. He had purchased the fertilizer in February 1995 at the Manhattan Cooperative Extension, Manhattan, Kansas.

Some of the events on April 19-21, 1995, may be out of chronological order.

At approximately 3:00 p.m., Nichols went to the police station and was interviewed by the FBI. Nichols did not tell the interviewing FBI Agents about his involvement in the bombing because of the following: he feared retaliation by McVeigh; Reno's statement about getting the death penalty; law enforcement would not believe Nichols because McVeigh had made it appear that he was responsible; he was in a state of denial that the bombing actually happened; and that others involved by may harm his family.

[redacted] McVeigh gave some of the Primadet blasting caps to [redacted]. The FBI recovered blasting caps at Nichols' residence. Nichols and McVeigh discharged six at a campsite in Kingman, Arizona, to verify that they would function. McVeigh tried to sell some of the blasting caps to [redacted] (phonetic) from Chicago, Illinois.

Dear Mr. Ashcroft,

Good day. I am TERRY L. NICHOLS - the one who has now been tried twice for the Oklahoma City bombing - once each by the Federal Gov't. and the State of Oklahoma, who each sought the death penalty against me.

I am writing to you at this time in regards to an unresolved issue which concerns both my Federal & State trials and thus the F.B.I.'s investigation & the D.O.J.'s actions.

This matter involves 2 individuals who each testified in both the Federal & State trials as prosecution witnesses and who each deliberately, intentionally and willfully lied numerous times and did so with the full knowledge & support of both the Federal Gov't. & the State Gov't. prosecutors along with others. Those

2 people are ROGER MOORE & KAREN ANDERSON formerly of Royal, AR., now residing in the State of Florida.

They lied about different things, but I will focus only on one issue and primarily on Roger Moore. If you do not know of Mr. Moore's lies and his background then I strongly recommend that you check with your people regarding Mr. Moore's shady activities as well as his knowledge, purchase, possession, and distribution of "KINE-STIK" (a.k.a., KINE-PAK) along with other explosive components. Your people know very well what I'm referring to.

Now I felt it was only right to come to you first regarding this issue to give you the opportunity to set the record straight, for I hear that you're a man of high integrity. However, if you're not willing to publicly acknowledge & announce what involvement Roger Moore had in the Oklahoma City bombing then you leave me no choice, because I will then do so.

I'm also able & willing to provide physical evidence proving that Mr. Moore not only lied repeatedly in both Federal & State courts but that he possessed explosive components such as Kine-Stik.

In addition, Mr. Moore sold blasting caps among other things. Thus he was and is very knowledgeable about various types of explosives.

The truth is there is no way that the F.B.I. and/or

other Federal agencies did not know of Mr. Moore's knowledge of explosives & willful coverup of such facts by the Federal Gov't.

Now the Oklahoma City bombing occurred on President Clinton & Atty. Gen. Janet Reno's watch as did the initial coverup with Mr. Moore. However, this coverup is continuing under your watch & President Bush's - This is not good and it could easily work against you and the current administration with devastating ~~rest~~ results. I say this only as a fact.

By the way, I'm not looking for any favors or such. I am simply wanting the full truth to come out. Thus I am willing to disclose publicly all I know, including how I was involved in the OKC bombing. This could be done in a cooperative effort which would maintain this current administration's integrity - the choice is yours.

You and many others may think otherwise, but I never intended nor planned for the OKC bombing to occur.

I am prepared to go public about the above facts after September 30, 2004. If you want this to work in a positive way then I strongly suggest that you contact me as soon as possible. Time is short, don't wait till the last minute.

If you are going to deny or try to manipulate the facts that Roger Moore had absolutely no part, directly or indirectly, in the Oklahoma City bombing and that.

he has no knowledge of explosives (particularly Kine-stik), nor possessed any, or is not in any way connected with the Federal Gov't. in some capacity, then please do not waste your time or mine in contacting me.

Should you choose to deny, manipulate or remain silent it will be clear evidence to me and others that you want to ignore, deny and coverup the truth and suppress it from the public, not to mention the survivors & victims. However, I would hope that you would do the right thing for all those concerned.

I look forward in hearing from you soon.

Terry Lynn Nichols, white male, date of birth April 1, 1955, place of birth Lapeer, Michigan, Social Security Account Number 371-68-4869, was interviewed. Nichols is currently incarcerated at the United States Penitentiary, Administration Maximum (ADX), 5880 State Highway 67 South, P.O. Box 8500, Florence, Colorado, 81226.

Lieutenant [redacted] United States Penitentiary, ADX, 5880 State Highway 67 South, P.O. Box 8500, Florence, Colorado, 719-784-5252, was present during the interview.

Nichols is serving multiple life terms for his role in the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

A few days after the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing, Nichols recovered Tim McVeigh's license plate, a rifle, an ammunition can and a hand grenade. The material was recovered from a storage unit rented by Nichols and McVeigh. Nichols placed all of the material in Nichols' vehicle and drove north, out of Herrington, Kansas.

A short distance north of town, Nichols drove over a bridge spanning a river. While crossing the bridge, Nichols threw the license plate out of the driver's window and into the river.

Nichols proceeded north and then east on a gravel road. Nichols placed the rifle under a box spring or mattress near the edge of a river. The hand grenade was either placed in the ammunition can then buried near the rifle or thrown in the river.

Nichols was provided with an aerial photograph provided by the interviewing agent. Nichols requested that an "X" be placed on the aerial photograph indicating where McVeigh's license plate was thrown.

Nichols told McVeigh that McVeigh had "tested the loyalty" of [redacted] McVeigh requested that [redacted] purchase a case of ammunition and mail it to McVeigh in Arizona. Nichols could not recall how McVeigh "tested the loyalty" of [redacted] McVeigh wanted to know if any request from McVeigh to [redacted]

would be reported to anyone else. McVeigh felt that [redacted] were loyal to McVeigh.

In the summer 1993, Nichols was present when McVeigh spoke to [redacted] by telephone. The telephone call took place while Nichols and McVeigh were at the farm of [redacted]. Nichols is aware of letters sent to [redacted] from McVeigh. The letters contained information about the November 1994 burglary of [redacted] residence. The November 1994 burglary of [redacted] residence was committed by Nichols. Nichols sent letters to McVeigh at addresses in Arizona and New York.

Nichols and McVeigh stole explosives from a rock quarry located in Kansas. One type of explosive stolen was Primadet. Primadet consists of a blasting cap attached to a sixty foot shock tube. Nichols and McVeigh were not familiar with Primadet. Nichols and McVeigh removed a blasting cap from the shock tube. Nichols and McVeigh stuck a piece of green cannon fuse into the blasting cap to see if it could be detonated using green cannon fuse. The blasting cap removed from the shock tube was detonated using green cannon fuse. Nichols did not disassemble any of the electric blasting caps stolen from the rock quarry. Nichols purchased electric matches, which have orange and white wire, while attending gun shows. The electric matches were not used to detonate the truck bomb used in the 1995 bombing. McVeigh used green cannon fuse to detonate the truck bomb used in the 1995 bombing. McVeigh did not want to use an electric detonation system. McVeigh believed that a non-electric detonation system was more reliable. Further, McVeigh believed that an electric detonation system could be accidentally discharged using a radio controller. McVeigh told Nichols that the green cannon fuse used to detonate the 1995 truck bomb was given by or traded from Moore.

Nichols was not present when McVeigh rented the Ryder truck used in the 1995 truck bombing. Nichols recalled McVeigh advising on Friday, April 14, 1995 that McVeigh had rented or reserved a rental truck. The conversation was held at the Geary Lake Wildlife Area. Geary Lake Wildlife Area is eight to ten miles south of Junction City, Kansas. Nichols did not have any knowledge where the rental truck was stored prior to the 1995 truck bombing.

[redacted] testified at Nichols's trial held by the State of Oklahoma. [redacted] testified that [redacted] had no knowledge of Kinestick or Kinestick, a binary explosive. In the summer 1993, McVeigh came to the farm of [redacted]. McVeigh removed a green ammunition can from the trunk of McVeigh's car. The ammunition can contained approximately six tubes of Kinestick and six tubes of nitromethane. McVeigh told Nichols that McVeigh got the Kinestick and nitromethane from [redacted]. [redacted] was later identified by McVeigh to Nichols. [redacted] In November 1994, Nichols committed a burglary of [redacted] residence. Nichols stole a case of nitromethane tubes that were in [redacted] residence. Nichols went into a back room of [redacted] residence and saw approximately six Kinesticks on a counter. The Kinesticks were very similar to the same Kinesticks that McVeigh showed Nichols in 1993. Nichols believed that gun show customers of [redacted] would have knowledge of [redacted] selling explosive components.

Nichols may have mis-spoke during a previous interview. The Kinestick used to build the truck bomb responsible for the 1995 bombing was provided by [redacted]. This is in contrast to the information provided earlier that indicated the Kinestick was stolen from the rock quarry. On Tuesday April 18, 1995, McVeigh and Nichols were building the truck bomb at Geary Lake Wildlife Area. Nichols noticed McVeigh [redacted].

[redacted] Nichols asked McVeigh where McVeigh had gotten the Kinestick. McVeigh told Nichols that McVeigh got the Kinestick from Moore. Nichols could not recall, prior to the building of the truck bomb, seeing McVeigh load the Kinestick into the rental truck.

Nichols is aware of Elohim City, Oklahoma but has never visited Elohim City, Oklahoma. McVeigh told Nichols that Elohim City, Oklahoma and [redacted] residence would be safe places for McVeigh.

Nichols asked if McVeigh if "something big" involved robbing a bank. McVeigh told Nichols it was not robbing a bank.

TERRY LYNN NICHOLS (NICHOLS), date of birth April 1, 1955, was contacted at the HERINGTON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY (HDPS), Herington, Kansas, at approximately 3:15 p.m. on April 21, 1995. NICHOLS was advised of the identity of Special Agents (SAs) [redacted] and [redacted] who thereafter searched him. At approximately 4:12 p.m., SA [redacted] and SA [redacted] arrived at the interview location. NICHOLS was then made aware of the identity of these SAs. All matters discussed previously were reviewed. The remaining interview was conducted by SA [redacted] and SA [redacted]. SA [redacted] and SA [redacted] were then present with NICHOLS during breaks.

When asked for his Social Security Account Number (SSAN), NICHOLS stated he believed it was 371-68-4869. NICHOLS does not utilize his SSAN any longer and added his Kansas driver's license number was randomly generated, not his SSAN. NICHOLS is presently self-employed in the buying and selling of surplus military items to include: ammo cans, hand shovels, and other ARMY surplus items. NICHOLS attends "gun shows" throughout the country in order to sell this inventory.

NICHOLS first heard of his possible involvement in the Oklahoma City bombing on Friday, April 21, 1995, two days after the actual bombing. While driving to the local lumber yard, a radio broadcast from a station in Manhattan, Kansas, mentioned the names "TERRY [redacted] of Michigan as possibly being involved. NICHOLS then realized law enforcement personnel were probably seeking both he [redacted]. NICHOLS also heard two people were in the process of being arrested, one of which he believes was TIM McVEIGH. NICHOLS knew McVEIGH from ARMY basic training in Georgia in 1988. Both later served at Fort Riley, Kansas. Individuals in their unit were classified as 11 Bravo Infantry.

NICHOLS returned to his house after hearing this broadcast. Once there, NICHOLS asked [redacted] had seen anything on television, etc. [redacted] did not believe NICHOLS but he told her he was serious. He then switched the television to a news station which he was then able to do because they had just acquired cable programming earlier in the day. After watching for some period of time, NICHOLS saw a composite drawing. NICHOLS does not believe it looked similar to McVEIGH. NICHOLS advised McVEIGH has blonde hair, always wears a crew cut and never has much stubble.

NICHOLS began considering whether he should go to the HDPS to ascertain if law enforcement wanted him. NICHOLS considered this because he did not want another "Waco;" however, when NICHOLS left his home later, he took [redacted] to SURPLUS CITY, a business in Herington.

NICHOLS stated he wanted to trade some tools for shingles; however, when NICHOLS got out of his car at SURPLUS CITY, he had a "feeling" he was being followed. Consequently, he got back into his car and all three went to HDPS. Since [redacted] accompanied him to HDPS, no one was presently at their home which is located at 109 South 2nd Street, Herington. When asked, NICHOLS advised they were not headed out of town before they decided to stop at HDPS. As evidence of this, NICHOLS noted no clothing should be found in his truck which would indicate they were leaving town.

[redacted] who was mentioned in the same broadcast, is [redacted] [redacted] lives in a large, two story farm house at [redacted] NICHOLS previously lived in this house with [redacted] While they lived in that house, another child of NICHOLS and [redacted] died of suffocation. There was also a time, approximately two years ago, when McVEIGH had stayed in this house with the NICHOLSES. NICHOLS stated "McVEIGH stayed with us for a month, anywhere from two to six weeks."

After providing this preliminary information, NICHOLS was given an FD-395, "Interrogation: Advice of Rights" form at 3:26 p.m. NICHOLS was requested to read the form aloud, which he did. SAs [redacted] and [redacted] signed this form as witnesses to the fact and NICHOLS was made aware of its contents at 3:31 p.m. At 3:43 p.m., NICHOLS advised he understood his rights and would speak to the SAs but he refused to sign the FD-395. NICHOLS commented that the word "Interrogation" at the top of this form reminded him of the "Nazis" and, consequently, he does not like that word.

Later in the interview, at approximately 4:34 p.m., NICHOLS signed an FD-26, "Consent to Search" form, for his residence and his vehicle, a "Blue GMC 1984 1/2 ton pickup." NICHOLS asked if it was possible for either [redacted] or himself to be present during any search. After being told this was possible, NICHOLS executed the form by signing: Without Prejudice U.C.C. 1-207. (/s/ TERRY L. NICHOLS). NICHOLS also mentioned numerous times, subsequent to executing the FD-26, he was hopeful anyone doing the search would be able to tell the difference between cleaning solvents and bomb building materials. NICHOLS advised there is nothing in his house or truck that could be construed as bomb making materials.

NICHOLS was then asked to describe his most recent contact with McVEIGH. NICHOLS explained that approximately two months ago, NICHOLS sent McVEIGH a letter to his residence near Kingman, Arizona. In the letter, NICHOLS requested McVEIGH, if he were in the Las Vegas area, to pick up NICHOLS' television which was at [redacted] house. NICHOLS had given this television to his [redacted] to use but he decided he wanted it back.

NICHOLS then received a telephone call from McVEIGH at his residence on Easter Sunday, April 16, 1995. This call came at approximately 3:00 p.m., just after NICHOLS [redacted] who was visiting, finished with

Easter dinner. During this conversation, NICHOLS stated McVEIGH called him from Oklahoma City where he was experiencing car problems. McVEIGH told NICHOLS he was "pressed for time to get back east" to see his relatives, so if NICHOLS wanted his TV, he would have to come to Oklahoma City and get him. McVEIGH instructed NICHOLS to tell [redacted] he would be picking up McVEIGH in Omaha, Nebraska, not Oklahoma City. NICHOLS advised he left ten minutes after receiving McVEIGH's telephone call.

NICHOLS advised, McVEIGH had been traveling from Arizona to visit relatives in the eastern portion of the United States with the intention of bringing NICHOLS' television to him as well as to see another unidentified person who resides somewhere in the Midwest. McVEIGH asked NICHOLS during their telephone conversation on the afternoon of April 16, 1995, "Just keep this between the two of us." McVEIGH instructed NICHOLS to tell [redacted] he would be traveling to "Omaha," not Oklahoma City, to pick up McVEIGH because McVEIGH had car problems. McVEIGH was of a private nature in other phone contacts. McVEIGH has told NICHOLS no one is to know his (McVEIGH's) business. NICHOLS advised some of the things McVEIGH wanted privacy concerned "trivial matters." McVEIGH typically did not want people to know what he was doing and that is just his nature; however, NICHOLS claims he told [redacted] he had actually gone to Oklahoma City, and not Omaha, while they were driving to the HDPS this afternoon.

NICHOLS was asked about his most recent contact with McVEIGH before Easter, and before the letter in which NICHOLS requested the television be brought back. NICHOLS advised it was either in November 1994 or January 1995. At this point, NICHOLS advised, "In my eyes, I did not do anything wrong but I can see how lawyers can turn stuff around." NICHOLS added, "I did not know anything," and he explained he was hesitant to say much because lawyers "can turn stuff around." By this time, NICHOLS had heard McVEIGH was in custody. NICHOLS advised he neither saw McVEIGH at any hotel in Junction City nor did he see him with a rented Ryder truck. McVEIGH did not ask him about buying anything related to the bomb.

During this Easter Day telephone call, McVEIGH provided NICHOLS with the specific exits, roads, etc., on where to go in Oklahoma City so he could get to where McVEIGH wanted to be picked up. NICHOLS does not remember many of the directions but does recall being told to drive around city blocks and "make sure you come down 8th Street." From this, McVEIGH could locate NICHOLS for a ride.

NICHOLS believed it would take approximately five hours to get to Oklahoma City from Herington so he left about ten minutes after he received the call. NICHOLS stopped to refuel his GMC pickup truck with diesel fuel at a gas station in Kansas near the border of Oklahoma. This gas station was on the right side of the road and had snacks, sodas, etc., for sale inside. NICHOLS mentioned he would occasionally carry additional diesel fuel in the back of his truck. NICHOLS drove on U.S. Highway 77 in a southerly direction until he got near the Oklahoma border. At this juncture, he got on I-35 and headed toward Oklahoma City. NICHOLS did not pay any

tolls for the Kansas Turnpike, either on the way down to Oklahoma City or coming back.

NICHOLS recalls getting off the interstate in Oklahoma City by using one of the main downtown exits. While driving around, waiting for McVEIGH, NICHOLS "went past that building a couple of times," in reference to the Federal building which was later the target of a bomb on April 19th. As NICHOLS recalls it, when he traveled on 8th Street, he was usually driving toward the south.

NICHOLS drove around for at least 30 minutes waiting for McVEIGH. While driving around downtown, he kept passing "all big buildings." NICHOLS' route varied a little each time. At different points, he went as far as a car dealership in one direction and a United States Post Office in another. Nichols advised that when he was driving through the streets of Oklahoma City looking for McVEIGH, NICHOLS saw one parking lot that was empty. Eventually, while headed in an easterly direction on an unrecalled street, he spotted McVEIGH at the other end of an alley he happened to look down. NICHOLS traveled around the block, first turning north and then back to the west. NICHOLS recalls the street on which he met McVEIGH as being two-way.

After recalling it had been raining lightly while he was looking for McVEIGH, NICHOLS stated he did not recall McVEIGH or the television having been wet. NICHOLS believes McVEIGH was wearing a T-shirt, jeans and tennis shoes. McVEIGH usually wears either "combat boots" or tennis shoes as well as T-shirts without pockets or V-necks. McVEIGH was clean shaven when NICHOLS picked him up. In addition to the television, McVEIGH also placed his green military issue-appearing laundry bag, which had a drawstring (laundry bag), into the cab of the truck. NICHOLS did not see McVEIGH's vehicle, but by the way McVEIGH talked it sounded like it was a large model and McVEIGH was leaving it in Oklahoma City.

After McVEIGH was in the truck, he told NICHOLS how to get out of Oklahoma City. It had begun to rain harder while they were in the process of getting back to the interstate and continued to rain until they were in Kansas. On the way back, they stopped at a McDONALDS in an unrecalled town on U.S. Highway 77 in Kansas, but only McVEIGH got food. They also stopped in Florence, Kansas later so they could get diesel fuel. NICHOLS believes this gas station was on the southwest corner of the highway intersection. NICHOLS paid for the diesel fuel with cash and did not ask for any money from McVEIGH. It was during this last stop that NICHOLS moved the television from inside the passenger compartment to the back of the truck. From there, they went directly to Junction City, arriving there at approximately 1:30 a.m. on April 17, 1995.

At times McVEIGH would tell NICHOLS things "in code." When NICHOLS would think about them later, he was be able to understand. NICHOLS and McVEIGH talked in generalities on the trip from Oklahoma City to Junction City. After picking up McVEIGH in Oklahoma City, he seemed "hyper or nervous." During their trip, they did discuss articles about Waco which had appeared in the SPOTLIGHT

NEWSLETTER.

While discussing each other's future intentions, McVEIGH stated, "You will see something big in the future." NICHOLS advised he was talking about what he had been doing in conjunction with military shows and selling surplus. McVEIGH then stated, "I'm doing fine. I should get something going here shortly. You will see something big in the future." NICHOLS responded, "What are you going to do, rob a bank?" McVEIGH responded, "Oh no, I got something in the works." This specific discussion ended when they became distracted by something else. NICHOLS did not ask McVEIGH what "in the works" meant and McVEIGH had used the expression "in the works" in past discussions.

McVEIGH mentioned there would be a gathering/rally in Washington, DC, this coming week in regard to the Waco incident and its coming anniversary. NICHOLS advised this was to be a remembrance or something similar, but McVEIGH did not say he was going to be a part of it or even going to it at all. In their discussion, NICHOLS mentioned the incident (Waco) occurred a year or two ago and McVEIGH said, "Yes, it was two years."

As the trip progressed, McVEIGH asked NICHOLS a couple of questions about conversations they had just had, and NICHOLS told him he did not remember. NICHOLS advised he often gets that way, and described it as "sleepy-tired" at times when he drives.

NICHOLS believed McVEIGH must know someone in Junction City to stay with and give him access to a vehicle; however, NICHOLS could not provide any names or addresses. When they arrived at the McDONALDS on South Washington Street in Junction City it was closed. McVEIGH said to drop him off there anyway and he would call someone. McVEIGH had indicated he was hungry and NICHOLS noticed there was a DENNY'S open up the street. McVEIGH did not ask to be taken there. NICHOLS pulled his truck between McDONALDS and a TEXACO or CONOCO gas station/convenience store, allowing McVEIGH to exit. All McVEIGH took with him was his laundry bag.

As he got out of the truck, McVEIGH said, "I'll catch you on the way back," which is what he would typically say as they parted company. McVEIGH then began walking toward the convenience store/gas station. NICHOLS then returned to Washington Street and headed toward the interstate. NICHOLS returned to Herington, Kansas, arriving home at approximately 2:00 a.m. on the morning of April 17, 1995.

NICHOLS' next contact with McVEIGH was when McVEIGH called NICHOLS at his residence on Tuesday morning (April 18, 1995). This call was at approximately 6:00 a.m. and NICHOLS was already awake. McVEIGH explained, "I'd like to use your pickup a little bit" because "I need to pick up a few things and look at a few vehicles." NICHOLS told McVEIGH that Fort Riley was having a sealed bid auction running from Monday through Wednesday (April 17-19, 1995) and he was

planning on attending that day and would be in the area.

NICHOLS told McVEIGH if it was not going to take too long, McVEIGH could drop NICHOLS off at the auction so he could review the items for sale and McVEIGH could then use the truck. McVEIGH said he was not in a "real hurry" so NICHOLS stayed home about an hour and left about 7:00 a.m. NICHOLS and McVEIGH agreed to meet at 7:30 a.m. at the same McDONALDS in Junction City where he had been dropped off in the early hours of Monday morning. NICHOLS met McVEIGH at the McDONALDS and they drove to Fort Riley.

From McDONALDS, they proceeded to I-70 eastbound. They exited at K-18, went through Ogden, Kansas, and then returned to the post (Fort Riley). Once they arrived, NICHOLS got out and told McVEIGH to be back at noon. When McVEIGH did not show up at noon, NICHOLS entered another building which also had items on which to bid. NICHOLS had to sign-in to enter that building. He looked at those items for approximately one hour and then went back outside. McVEIGH appeared shortly thereafter. NICHOLS then returned McVEIGH to the same McDONALDS. McVEIGH had the green bag when he met him at McDONALDS and that is all he had when he was dropped off later. NICHOLS advised McVEIGH "lives and travels light."

McVEIGH said he had a room in Junction City. McVEIGH knew someone around Junction City where he possibly could get a vehicle and continue on his way home to New York State to see his relatives. McVEIGH had said he bought the car, which NICHOLS feels was in Oklahoma City, that was cheap and McVEIGH did not know if it was worth fixing. McVEIGH had traded or bought two or three vehicles since NICHOLS had seen him last, in November 1994. McVEIGH would buy cheap cars and did not have very good luck with them.

At one point, McVEIGH owned a compact Chevrolet. McVEIGH had been involved in an accident, acquired another car and later purchased a car from [redacted] in January 1995. NICHOLS described the car [redacted] sold McVEIGH as being an older Chevrolet or Pontiac, small station wagon, with a hatch and was dark blue in color. McVEIGH paid \$400 or \$500 cash to [redacted] for the car. McVEIGH had been in Decker, Michigan when his vehicle was hit and he subsequently bought the [redacted] car. When McVEIGH bought [redacted] car, McVEIGH did not acquire the proper license. He went west and NICHOLS was not sure if McVEIGH changed the plates on the car. NICHOLS does not believe the car that broke down in Oklahoma City was the same one purchased from [redacted]. NICHOLS believes McVEIGH spent the same amount of money on repairs for the [redacted] car as what he had paid for it.

McVEIGH told NICHOLS he had looked at several cars while NICHOLS was at the Fort Riley auction. NICHOLS assumes McVEIGH might have even bought a car that was in Junction City. As McVEIGH got out of NICHOLS' truck at McDONALDS, McVEIGH mentioned to NICHOLS there were belongings in a storage

shed in Herington, saying "if I don't pick them up, pick them up for me." NICHOLS has not seen McVEIGH since. From there, NICHOLS drove to Manhattan, Kansas, to pick up his mail at MAILBOXES ETC., 1228 West Loop, Box 197. NICHOLS then returned to Herington, handled a few errands, and returned home.

On Thursday, April 20, 1995, NICHOLS removed McVEIGH's sleeping bag, rucksack and rifle from the storage facility and put them in his garage at 109 South 2nd Street in Herington. When asked if any of the items were his, NICHOLS responded, "no." When asked about the possibility of opening the rucksack and finding articles inside which could have his (NICHOLS) fingerprints, he answered that any such item would have to have been something he had given to McVEIGH previously. NICHOLS advised McVEIGH's rifle was on a box next to the fuel meter, which are now located in NICHOLS' garage. There had been a combination lock on the storage facility in Herington and there is nothing remaining in the storage facility. This storage facility is located across the street from a PIZZA HUT and is approximately five foot by ten foot. It is the second storage locker up from the south end, on the east side.

NICHOLS did not hear about the Wednesday, April 19, 1995 bombing in Oklahoma City until he was at the home cable television sales outlet in Herington on April 20, 1995, while securing service for his residence. After seeing a news report while at this office, NICHOLS purchased three different newspapers to read about the bombing. NICHOLS advised he had not heard about this event prior to this time, since his home television had little reception until the morning of April 21, 1995, at 9:00 a.m., when his cable was installed.

NICHOLS received a call from [redacted] on Friday, April 21, 1995 [redacted] was mad because NICHOLS had told [redacted] while he was visiting him about the \$3,000 in cash which was going to be placed in an account for him. In January, 1995 NICHOLS gave [redacted] \$3,000 cash while he was in Las Vegas, which was to have been placed in an [redacted] had told him in January [redacted] would make a copy of the bank statements and send them to NICHOLS after the account was opened. NICHOLS never received any statement. [redacted] called this morning because [redacted] had told [redacted] about NICHOLS having given LANA \$3,000 cash for an account for [redacted]

[redacted] got upset after NICHOLS talked to [redacted] wanted to go home to the [redacted] because she has friends there and none here. [redacted] stated, "You got friends like TIM." [redacted] said earlier this morning that McVEIGH lives his life on the edge, using his fast driving as an example. NICHOLS advised these latter comments had been made before they had "heard" McVEIGH had been arrested.

When NICHOLS was entering the house after having heard his name mentioned on a radio broadcast, [redacted] was about to get off the phone with her friend [redacted]



(LNU) resides in California but they met back in the [redacted] and [redacted] were joking about "TIM" being involved in the Oklahoma City bombing. It was at this point that [redacted] did not believe NICHOLS when he told her his name had been mentioned on the radio as also being involved in the bombing. They turned the television to a news station for 15 minutes and JANET RENO was giving what appeared to be a press conference. NICHOLS stated, "I then heard TIM's name on the TV for the first time." RENO stated McVEIGH had been picked up for a car violation not far from Oklahoma City.

NICHOLS stated, "I thought and swore I cannot believe it was him, because he was heading back to see his family and he was back there in Oklahoma City. When I heard his name on TV, that is when I figured out why my name was on the radio, because I was his friend." NICHOLS stated, "I was feeling shock, because I heard my name." NICHOLS asked, "How am I involved? How am I connected to it?" NICHOLS advised, "I must not have known him that well for him to do that." NICHOLS feels his friendship with McVEIGH is the same now as it was five years ago.

NICHOLS advised he and McVEIGH have gone their separate ways recently because McVEIGH did not like all of NICHOLS joking and practical jokes. McVEIGH had even told [redacted] he did not like all the joking around. Regarding his possible involvement, NICHOLS stated, "I feel upset that I am involved, in a sense, because of him, and knowing that I am not." NICHOLS added, "I feel I cannot trust anyone anymore than TIM. I would be shocked if he implicated me. TIM takes responsibility for his actions, and he lives up to his arrangements."

In discussing McVEIGH's possible involvement, NICHOLS stated, "I cannot see why he would do it." McVEIGH had told NICHOLS he was going to get an inheritance shortly from his grandfather. Consequently, NICHOLS could not understand why McVEIGH would do a bombing because shortly he could do whatever he wanted to do.

NICHOLS had bought two, 50 pound bags of Ammonium Nitrate about one month ago from the MANHATTAN ELEVATOR. NICHOLS still has the receipts for this Ammonium Nitrate purchase at his house. NICHOLS advised he has read books about Ammonium Nitrate. NICHOLS purchased the Ammonium Nitrate because he was going to sell one pound bags of Ammonium Nitrate for \$5 to \$10 at gun shows, instead of the \$35 the individual at the Tulsa show had been selling them for. NICHOLS was going to sell this Ammonium Nitrate as fertilizer. An accompanying instruction sheet described the Ammonium Nitrate as nitrogen which, when diluted with water, was plant food. NICHOLS had eight ounce and 24 ounce plastic containers in his basement that he was using to put the Ammonium Nitrate in for the sales.

NICHOLS has sold these eight ounce and 24 ounce Ammonium Nitrate containers at gun shows every weekend since acquiring the Ammonium Nitrate, excluding Easter weekend. NICHOLS advised that now, "If I sell any more at these shows, they will question me." NICHOLS put what remained of his Ammonium Nitrate

on his lawn this morning. NICHOLS advised that he did not mention this Ammonium Nitrate earlier in the interview because it would "make me look guilty to a jury." NICHOLS then added he felt any person with Ammonium Nitrate would be potential suspects. NICHOLS was asked if he actually thought each farm and homeowner would be a potential suspect based solely on the fact they possess Ammonium Nitrate and NICHOLS responded he did.

In reference to NICHOLS' past, in the late 1980's [redacted] suggested they separate for two to three years, and maybe NICHOLS should go into the ARMY, which he did. At that time [redacted] which also housed an ARMY Recruiting Office. It was through this office that NICHOLS was recruited. NICHOLS was in the ARMY for almost one year and received an honorable discharge in May 1989.

While [redacted] was not taking care of him. Consequently, NICHOLS tried to get [redacted] and at the present time he has [redacted]. Toward the end of his enlistment, NICHOLS was scheduled to go for a two week tour in Germany. Prior to leaving for Germany, his Sergeant told him he would remain behind. NICHOLS was tasked to drive visiting German Officers at Fort Riley. After two weeks of this detail, NICHOLS was told to decide if he wanted to stay in the ARMY. NICHOLS' decision was to leave the ARMY.

In regard to NICHOLS' prior residences, NICHOLS was born in Lepeer, Michigan, where [redacted]. He twice lived in a house/farm owned by [redacted]. This house/farm was purchased by NICHOLS' family in approximately 1975. NICHOLS lived at this address from 1975 to 1980 and again from 1991 to 1993. NICHOLS' remodeled this two-story farmhouse in the 1970's. [redacted] may now own this house and is presently living there.

When NICHOLS married [redacted] he moved into her house in [redacted] Michigan. They later sold that residence and bought another house in [redacted]. After NICHOLS left the ARMY, NICHOLS moved into a house on Argyle Road, Snover, Michigan. NICHOLS later moved from Michigan to Las Vegas because he wanted to sell military surplus, get into more gun shows, and because he felt it was too cold during the long Michigan winters.

By moving to Las Vegas, NICHOLS was able to be near [redacted]. NICHOLS lived there for six months to a year and saw [redacted] quite a bit; however, NICHOLS could not find a good paying job in Las Vegas. He moved to Marion, Kansas when he had found a job with the [redacted]. NICHOLS wanted to work for the [redacted] because they had new JOHN DEERE tractors for the workers and because they provided NICHOLS, [redacted] with a home two miles south of the [redacted].

NICHOLS advised [redacted] traveled to the Philippines in

September, 1994. NICHOLS left for the Philippines on November 11, 1994, departing from Las Vegas, and returned on January 17, 1995. NICHOLS had a 59 day visa and came back just days before it was due to expire. NICHOLS planned to return to the United States so he bought an open-ended, round trip ticket.

After he returned from the Philippines, NICHOLS began trying to find housing in either the Manhattan or Junction City area; however, he found that homes and guns in those areas were too expensive. NICHOLS looked at multiple listing services for the Manhattan area, saw two realtors in Junction City, and then called another realtor in Manhattan. NICHOLS advised both the realtors in Junction City had offices located on 6th Street, one on the north side and the other on the south side, closer to Main Street. NICHOLS was looking for an owner-financing house to purchase. Included in some of the home listings were homes in Herington, Kansas. He found a house there and moved in in either February or March 1995. While he was looking for this house, NICHOLS stayed at the SUNSET MOTEL in Junction City for approximately "three weeks."

Regarding his business dealings, McVEIGH visited with NICHOLS about selling items at gun shows with NICHOLS. NICHOLS wanted to go it alone and make his business by selling ARMY surplus items. NICHOLS had wanted better working hours than he had with [REDACTED] as this would allow him more time to see his family. McVEIGH wanted to handle and sell more guns than did NICHOLS. NICHOLS wanted to concentrate more on the purchase and sale of ARMY surplus items. NICHOLS believed he could pick up ARMY surplus items inexpensively in the Junction City area and sell them at gun shows.

NICHOLS and McVEIGH worked one gun show in Colorado, two or three shows in Arizona, and one in Nevada. Sometimes, both NICHOLS and McVEIGH would drive to the shows, other times only one would go depending on the volume of goods for sale. NICHOLS and McVEIGH would usually pool their money, deduct their expenses, and then split the proceeds. NICHOLS pays all of his expenses in cash as he does not have a checking account, savings account, or credit cards. NICHOLS advised he does not pay or believe in the Federal income tax system.

Both NICHOLS and McVEIGH would stay at the sales table during the shows. NICHOLS advised that he would review the "GUN SHOW CALENDAR" magazine looking for gun shows to attend which were close to home. NICHOLS advised that he does not have any friendships with any other operators at the gun shows and neither does McVEIGH.

When asked about the MICHIGAN MILITIA (MM), NICHOLS advised it is a big organization. NICHOLS, MARIFE, and NICOLE attended a gun show which was attended by members of the MM. Their trip to Michigan required them to be gone for approximately one week. They left Herington on April 5, 1995 and returned on or about April 10, 1995. At this gun show, NICHOLS sold 30 cases of Meals Ready to Eat (MRE) in 15 minutes to people from the MM. Although these people did not

identify themselves to NICHOLS, he heard later the MM had been buying his MREs.

NICHOLS saw people walking around at the gun show with full Battle Dress Uniforms (BDUs). NICHOLS learned these people were associated with the MM. NICHOLS has never attended any MM or other similar organizations' meetings. NICHOLS stated, "I do not know anyone in the Michigan Militia." NICHOLS sold ten additional cases of the MREs at this gun show. His price was initially \$30 a case, but later he sold some cases for \$32 each. NICHOLS sold his last few cases to two 60 year old ladies.

At most of the gun shows NICHOLS has attended, NICHOLS heard people say the FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION (FBI) and the BUREAU OF ALCOHOL, TOBACCO AND FIREARMS (BATF) went to Waco and murdered the people there and something should be done about it. NICHOLS would respond to such statements by saying "possibly." Some people say the government is "getting out of hand," and NICHOLS advised "I feel that way also on occasion." NICHOLS advised some guys get "hyped" and want to do something about it. When asked, if in his sight, there was anything McVEIGH said on the way from Oklahoma City to Junction City that caused NICHOLS to believe McVEIGH was involved in the bombing, and NICHOLS responded "yes." McVEIGH was much more "hyped" about "Waco" than NICHOLS.

Neither NICHOLS or McVEIGH had friends in the Ordinance Section while they were in the ARMY. McVEIGH had mentioned a [redacted] in reference to shows McVEIGH has attended. [redacted] at these gun shows. When asked, it was NICHOLS' opinion that any person could sell privately owned guns without needing a Federal Firearms License. Approximately 15 percent of NICHOLS' gun show sales are generated by his sale of guns. Over 50 percent of McVEIGH's gun show sales are generated by his sale of guns. Neither NICHOLS nor McVEIGH have a Federal Firearms License.

NICHOLS and McVEIGH would see newsletters, articles, etc., as in the SPOTLIGHT, writings of [redacted] and [redacted] etc., and they would discuss the contents. [redacted] is the most decorated police officer in [redacted] Arizona, since retired, who writes a column. [redacted] wrote a book, "AID AND ABET," that NICHOLS has read. NICHOLS advised these types of individuals promote the "right to bear arms." NICHOLS advised both he and [redacted] follow the U.S. Constitution. [redacted] department twice, after which he got "fed up" and retired. [redacted] now writes speeches about individual's rights under the U.S. Constitution. [redacted] ran for [redacted] in 1992.

NICHOLS believes the SPOTLIGHT and similar publications would "open eyes" to an alternative reporting versus what is presented in the mass media. NICHOLS believes in many of these alternative ideas. Anyone can go to any gun show and find books on how to make bombs, cannons, guns, silencers, etc. NICHOLS advised that he has bought books at various guns shows on cannons and how to establish credit.

NICHOLS' attention was then directed to his knowledge of McVEIGH. It is NICHOLS opinion McVEIGH has become more "hyper" or "nervous" in recent times. McVEIGH was in Desert Storm and NICHOLS feels a lot of the change seemed to come after that. NICHOLS did not serve during Desert Storm.

NICHOLS believes McVEIGH has friends in Junction City, both in an out of the military. NICHOLS does not know these people, even though McVEIGH may have mentioned names in the past. NICHOLS and McVEIGH once roomed in the barracks at Fort Riley with some of McVEIGH's present associates. NICHOLS recalls one individual by the name of [redacted] who was an individual known by both McVEIGH and NICHOLS in 1988.

McVEIGH served in the ARMY for four to five years and he got out of the ARMY early, after his Desert Storm service. After Desert Storm, McVEIGH trained to make the Special Forces. While on a training run/walk with a friend from Desert Storm, McVEIGH decided not to continue his Special Forces training, and a short time later left the ARMY. NICHOLS assumes McVEIGH received an honorable discharge. NICHOLS advised McVEIGH was "pissed off" at his sergeant before he was discharged.

McVEIGH travels a lot and is not at one address for an extended period of time. Last fall, when NICHOLS and McVEIGH were out west for some gun shows, there was a week when they stayed in the desert near Kingman, Arizona. McVEIGH has a house in Golden Valley, Arizona, which is outside Kingman. In describing McVEIGH, NICHOLS advised "he's a loner." NICHOLS believes it is possible McVEIGH could make a device to blow up a building without NICHOLS' knowledge and that "he could be capable of doing it."

McVEIGH knows guns very well but "is no sharp shooter." McVEIGH can break guns down quickly, all the way down to the "bare parts." McVEIGH knows the names of a variety of makes and models of guns, their round capability, the velocity of bullets, different calibers, ballistics, etc. McVEIGH knows guns better than NICHOLS, as McVEIGH has more interest in guns. In regard to guns, NICHOLS looks at the sale of guns as a means of making money, but McVEIGH looks at guns as a way to talk to people. NICHOLS advised he is trying to sell some of his personal weapons because "I may have too many."

The following mutual associates are people McVEIGH is closer to than NICHOLS, including some non-military: 1. [redacted]

with whom McVEIGH lived in Salina, Kansas, who was also in the ARMY).

The following are common acquaintances of NICHOLS and McVEIGH's, but these people are more apt to be classified as NICHOLS' friends: 1) [redacted] One year older than NICHOLS); 2) [redacted] Michigan (used to work on [redacted] m); and [redacted] father who used to work on [redacted] farm.)

The following are JAMES NICHOLS' friends who are also acquainted with NICHOLS and McVEIGH but that NICHOLS knows better: [redacted]

[redacted] and another whose name is unrecalled). McVEIGH gets along better with the [redacted] s mother lives in [redacted] and his father lives in [redacted]

NICHOLS was recently at a gun show in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where he talked to an individual who had a booth selling items related to explosives. NICHOLS talked to this individual quite a bit. NICHOLS learned that there are lot of chemicals involved in making an explosive; to include Ammonium Nitrate; potassium and "something" else. NICHOLS further advised nitrogen, potassium and phosphorous from fertilizers can be used for bombs also. NICHOLS asked this individual specific questions about uses of the different chemicals and this individual was rude to NICHOLS because he felt NICHOLS should have known the answers to those questions. NICHOLS also talked to others who said there was no problem selling chemical items associated with bomb making.

NICHOLS has read articles that have come across the table at gun shows about bomb making. NICHOLS would review these articles and talk to McVEIGH about the different types of bombs and if the bombs would work, and whether the directions on making the bombs sounded logical. NICHOLS and McVEIGH discussed the bombing literature and would ask each other, whether it made sense or would this bomb make more sense than another bomb? NICHOLS advised that McVEIGH knows "as much as I do about bombs." NICHOLS advised that McVEIGH has lots of free time and likes to stay busy by reading, etc. about guns and bombs.

By talking with different people at gun shows, NICHOLS heard you need certain types of fertilizer to make a bomb and it was a nitrogen based fertilizer. NICHOLS advised he does not think a liquid fertilizer could have done the Oklahoma City bomb.

NICHOLS advised a 28 percent nitrogen mixture could lead to an explosion and that there are different percentages in making the right mixture for a bomb. Some people say urea can lead to an explosion and some people say it can not. NICHOLS does not know, but he is aware that urea is a granular solid like the fertilizer people place on lawns.

Another granular fertilizer is Ammonium Nitrate. Ammonium Nitrate can be used to make a bomb. NICHOLS stated, "I imagine you have to put a blasting cap on it to explode." NICHOLS recounted a farmer who stopped by his table at one of the gun shows and discussed blowing tree stumps out of the ground. This farmer told NICHOLS to take Ammonium Nitrate and diesel fuel and mix it. Someone would then bore a hole underneath the tree stump and pour the mixture down the hole. The mixture is then detonated, producing an explosion which will remove the tree stump. Someone came by his table at a gun show and said to mix Ammonium Nitrate and diesel fuel for explosions involving quarry/rock work.

When questioned about any first hand knowledge about bomb making, NICHOLS stated, "I have not made any, so I do not know if the mixture stays granular or becomes liquid." NICHOLS advised there are ratios for the mixture in books, all the way from dry manure to Ammonium Nitrate with diesel fuel. NICHOLS stated, "I would assume electricity could start it." NICHOLS stated they now have electric blasting caps for the detonation and he assumes one could be utilized for detonation. NICHOLS advised Ammonium Nitrate could be purchased from the grain elevator in Junction City.

NICHOLS was asked about storage facilities in his care, custody or control. NICHOLS had a storage facility in Las Vegas, Nevada, from November 1994 to January 1995 for storage of his pickup truck and other personal items. NICHOLS used this storage when he went to the Philippines. NICHOLS also had the previously mentioned facility in Herington from which he had removed McVEIGH's belongings. NICHOLS also had a storage facility in Council Grove, Kansas, where he stored his household effects, guns, ammo, etc. This facility was utilized from October 1994 until March 1994 when NICHOLS purchased a house in Herington.

NICHOLS currently receives mail in both Herington and Manhattan. When questioned regarding recent UPS deliveries, NICHOLS advised he had a UPS delivery from QUARTAN, San Antonio, Texas, for \$800 in value for laser sights and that he paid cash for the shipment. On Monday and Tuesday of this week, NICHOLS received a COD package through the U.S. POSTAL SERVICE for approximately \$640. This was for a shipment of blow guns from BALISTICORP, a business in Nebraska.

When questioned about numerous large drums located in his garage, NICHOLS advised he secured them to hold trash, etc. These drums were bought in Marion at a dump. When discussing his fuel meter, NICHOLS advised he bought it at Fort Riley with the intention to sell it. NICHOLS paid only a percentage of what the meter was originally priced.

When asked if NICHOLS had any knowledge of whether [redacted] was involved in the Oklahoma City bombing, NICHOLS advised "no." When asked whether NICHOLS had any knowledge of McVEIGH being involved in the Oklahoma City bombing, NICHOLS advised, "I suspect it now." When asked about the name [redacted]

[redacted] NICHOLS advised, "That was the name TIM mentioned," in connection with a house McVEIGH shared in the Salina area. NICHOLS never knew [redacted] and has never met him. NICHOLS does not recall [redacted] being in NICHOLS' and McVEIGH's basic training unit together but NICHOLS believes [redacted] came into their company after NICHOLS separated.

When asked about a call he received from McVEIGH on Saturday morning (April 15, 1995) at 6:30 a.m., NICHOLS advised that he could not remember any such call.

At approximately 11:15 p.m., NICHOLS was allowed to listen to a taped message from [redacted] on the phone. NICHOLS listened to this tape twice after which he said, "I caught everything except for what my son said."

At approximately 12:03 a.m., on April 22, 1995, investigating agents handed NICHOLS four pages of letters and notes for NICHOLS to read. One page was a letter to TIM from TERRY. One page was entitled "Pick up storage." One page was entitled "Read and do immediately." And the last page was the back side of the "Read and do immediately" page. NICHOLS read the four pages and then advised, "I wrote it because I did not have a will." NICHOLS advised that these documents were sent to [redacted] with instructions to mail the letter to McVEIGH in the event of NICHOLS' death before January 1995. NICHOLS stated he prepared these documents because he was going to the Philippines and that is not a very safe destination. When asked if he wrote similar letters each time he had gone to the Philippines previously, NICHOLS responded that he had not, only this time.

NICHOLS advised that he did not know if he would return from the Philippines because the Filipinos do not like Americans and he may have been run over by a car. NICHOLS advised that [redacted] had separate instructions and she was not to open these until January 28, 1995. NICHOLS advised that [redacted] opened it up beforehand. NICHOLS advised that she said that she opened it up shortly after NICHOLS left the country because [redacted] and she felt a need to open it and explain it to [redacted]. NICHOLS advised that those pages described some personal effects and explained to [redacted] the letter to TIM McVEIGH.

Just before the interview was concluded, NICHOLS was offered the opportunity to take a polygraph examination to assist the agents in determining the truthfulness of his statement. NICHOLS declined saying he thought polygraphs were "not reliable." At this juncture, approximately 12:11 a.m., SAs [redacted] and [redacted] concluded and left the room as SAs [redacted] and [redacted] again entered the room to talk to NICHOLS.



It should be noted that SAs [redacted] and [redacted] were present intermittently during this interview. Those contacts are recorded in a separate document (FD-302).

NICHOLS SAID THERE ARE TANKS WHICH ARE MADE OUT OF

## FBI waited on tip about Oklahoma bomber

**WASHINGTON** - The FBI initially dismissed a tip that convicted bomber Terry Nichols had hidden explosives and they might be used for an attack this month coinciding with the anniversary of the Oklahoma City bombing.

While the FBI has found no evidence supporting the idea that an attack is in the works for the April 19 10th anniversary, the information that explosives had been hidden in Nichols' former home in Herington, Kan., turned out to be true.

The tip came from imprisoned mobster Gregory Scarpa Jr., 53, a law enforcement official said this week. Scarpa is an inmate in the same maximum-security federal prison in Florence, Colo., where Nichols is serving life sentences for his role in the 1995 bombing of the Alfred Murrah federal building that killed 168 people. Timothy McVeigh was convicted of federal conspiracy and murder charges in the bombing and executed in 2001.

Scarpa learned about the explosives from Nichols, mainly through notes passed between them, said Stephen Dresch, a Michigan man who is Scarpa's informal advocate.

Dresch gave the information to the FBI in early March. But FBI agents did not search the vacant house until March 31. The bureau did not act more quickly because Scarpa failed a lie detector test, said the law enforcement official, who

declined to be identified because of the sensitivity of the investigation.

The FBI lab continues to examine the materials for fingerprints and other clues that might show where the explosives originated and who may have had them before they got into Nichols' home.

Scarpa, a member of the Colombo organized crime family serving 50-plus years on drug trafficking, conspiracy and racketeering convictions, first communicated information about the explosives on March 1, then provided more details on March 10 and 11, Dresch said in letters sent to the staffs of two members of Congress and to the FBI's Detroit office. Scarpa revealed the location of the house on March 11, Dresch said.

The first letter said Scarpa learned from another prisoner, assumed by Dresch to be Nichols, "the location of a bomb on U.S. soil." The second described two rock piles in the crawl space beneath Nichols' former home. Under one, it said, were cardboard boxes wrapped in plastic. Those details match what the FBI said it found.

Aides to Reps. William Delahunt, D-Mass., and Dana Rohrabacher, R-Calif., acknowledged receiving the letters by fax. Delahunt's office received the letter on March 1 or 2 and forwarded it to the FBI, said Steve Schwadron, the lawmaker's chief of staff. The letter to Rohrabacher was not read until after the FBI search had been done, Rohrabacher spokeswoman Rebecca Rudman said.

The FBI refused to comment on the delay.

The bureau has faced harsh post-Sept. 11, 2001, criticism accusing it of failing to adequately investigate tips and intelligence.

Delahunt has chided the FBI for its dealings with informants, while Rohrabacher is considering requesting a hearing on the bureau's handling of the Oklahoma City investigation.

"I'm more concerned that the FBI didn't do a thorough job investigating this location 10 years ago than I am about how long it took to follow through on an informant's tip," Rohrabacher said.

Dresch, a Michigan economist, principal owner of Forensic Intelligence International and former state lawmaker, speculated that the FBI didn't act more quickly because Scarpa has a long, contentious history with federal authorities.

Valerie Caproni, now the FBI general counsel, was a prosecutor in Scarpa's 1998 trial in Brooklyn, N.Y. At the time, Scarpa testified he spied for the FBI on four suspects in the 1993 World Trade Center bombing, including convicted mastermind Ramzi Yousef, while they were jailed together in Manhattan.

Scarpa said he passed on to the FBI plans that said associates of the four men would kill a prosecutor in one of Yousef's trials and attack a federal judge he declined to name as well as unspecified "government installations."

Caproni and U.S. District Judge Reena Raggi scoffed at Scarpa's claims, which the judge called insignificant at best and more likely "part of a scam."

Freelance journalist Peter Lance has argued in his recent book, "Cover Up," that Scarpa's information was accurate and included tips that could have led the FBI to Khalid Shaikh Mohammed, Yousef's uncle, long before the Sept. 11 attacks Mohammed purportedly helped plan.

Lance has obtained transcripts of Scarpa's interviews with FBI agents in which he provided details of his dealings with Yousef.

Scarpa's father, the late Gregory Scarpa, was an FBI informant whom senior officials allowed to keep working with the bureau in the 1990s even though they suspected him of murder, according to Lindley DeVecchio, Scarpa's FBI handler.
